REPORT OF NORTH METRO TV

No report was presented.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE/OPERATORS COMMITTEE

- D. Swanson reported on the following items:
 - A plaque in memory and appreciation of Spring Lake Park Cable Commissioner Jeanne Mason was accepted, on behalf of her family, by Spring Lake Park Mayor Cindy Hansen.
 - The HD upgrade continues on schedule. The production truck was delivered on December 12th. Alpha Video is currently installing the new equipment in the truck. It is expected that the install will be done by mid-January.
 - NMTV staff member, Eric Houston, has visited or been in contact with all seven Cities' staff members responsible for the community bulletin board pages. Most Cities were excited to update the data pages with pages designed by Eric. Several Cities declined the offer for future visits to continue updating pages. All City staff members think that the recommended Carousel Bulletin Board systems are a good idea. Some Cities have chosen to continue to manage their own bulletin boards until the Carousel systems are installed. Programming Coordinator, Michele Silvester, has been scheduling City or community related programming on the City channels. These programs include a Yellow Ribbon City Ceremony, a Veteran's Day program, the live NMTV election program,, and NMTV news stories. It was requested that Michele be given permission to schedule additional programs at her own discretion. City staff can always make any programming requests at any time if they are so inclined. This would make scheduling the channels more efficient. NMTV staff have also met with several Cities regarding their HD upgrades and equipment issues.

REPORT OF LEGAL COUNSEL

- M. Bradley reported on the following items:
 - There has been a change in leadership in the Comcast Government Affairs department. The Vice President of Government Affairs, Emmett Coleman has left the company. As of now the position remains open.
 - CenturyLink has made a major acquisition. They have acquired a company called Level 3. The company services large businesses data needs.
 - The Commission should be aware of upcoming legislation. There's a bill that is being brought forward by AT&T to change the definition of rights of way. AT&T is suggesting that the long-standing definition be changed to include utility poles, water towers, and the sides of public buildings. This is important because if a City owns its utility poles they are able to rent them. This change would make the poles part of the right of way, and fees charged could be

restricted. There could be some real unintended consequences for Cities. The League of Minnesota Cities is watching this legislation carefully.

- The current FCC Chair has resigned and we will be seeing some new appointments to the FCC in the upcoming months.
- Comcast will be raising rates. The Commission no longer has any authority to regulate the basic rate. There is effective competition in the North Metro with the presence of CenturyLink.



NMTV News Highlights



The focus of the project was rethinking the boundaries of gender and identity. Over twenty students of different ages and grades from three schools contributed to the project. 




Home Movie Transfers

Home movie transfers proved to be a very popular service in December. Ads for the service were placed in Tid Bits and ClipNSave. People have been coming in with their coupons to transfer their home movies. In addition to transferring tape and film to DVD, over 1,400 pictures and slides were transferred in December, certainly the busiest month for that service since its introduction in August. More people requested that we perform the transfers, as opposed to doing it themselves for free. That resulted in \$1,704 in transfer fees.

HD Upgrade

The HD upgrade continues. The new production truck was delivered on December 12th. Alpha Video has been busy since then installing the new equipment. It is expected that the install should be completed by mid-January, with commissioning and punch lists to follow. We still need to have graphics put on the exterior of the truck, but the first shoot for the new vehicle is scheduled for the end of January. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR / OPERATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Staff requested that the Executive Committee approve a change order request that

remains of the bond money. The full truck wrap is quoted at \$5,119.51. The
Operations Committee recommended that the Commission approve doing so.

• Upgrading the Studio A sets was discussed. The current studio sets are over 10 years old and in disrepair. With HD technology the flaws are quite apparent. NMTV staff have been researching various set models and are close to a final design. It was requested that the Commission approve utilizing the reserve fund originally intended for the truck upgrade to pay for the new sets. The truck was replaced as part of the HD upgrade utilizing bond funds, making use of the reserved funds unnecessary. The Operations Committee recommended that the Commission approve purchasing new sets and that the truck fund reserves be used to pay for them.

• Staff reviewed materials related to the 2017 disbursement of 2016 franchise fees to Cities. This was the first year that the North Metro franchise area had competing cable companies, and there was some uncertainty regarding what to expect. Both the number of cable subscribers and the total amount of franchise fees collected increased markedly. The new percentages of individual City income related to total Member City income were noted. Franchise fees will be disbursed to Cities on Thursday, February 16th.

MOTION: To approve disbursement of the 2016 franchise fees, retained by the Member Cities, as presented in the disbursement materials. **Motion made by C. Hansen. Second, D. Swanson. Motion approved.**

Purchasing Carousel units for each Cities' government channel was discussed. The units would generate graphics and play videos on the government channels in HD. Pai Ready to Slice Into FCC Regulations

New chair planning to take aim at Title II; broadband privacy framework to follow

WASHINGTON - President Trump's pick of Ajit Pai atop the Federal Communications Commission was getting high fives from the industry last week, signaling the new president is OK with a strongly deregulatory course for the agency.

That's no huge surprise, given Trump's pledge to get rid of two regulations for every one added. The new president also

But the president has not made consistency a hallmark, and his naming of a network-neutrality fan to the transition team had raised some eyebrows in industry circles. Also a worry was Trump's saber-rattling at AT&T's merger with Time Warner Inc., and at Comcast.

But as Multichannel News first reported, the Trump administration has backed a deregulatory plan that could see the FCC's powers reduced and moved to other agencies - consumer proection to the Federal Trade Commission and merger reviews to the Justice Department.

Pai, the FCC's current senior Republican, was clearly the pick if a more-traditional deregulatory approach won the day over Trump's populist mantra of upsetting the old order and his anti-business stance toward his media industry critics.

Given that the FCC does not have to take orders from the White House, as well as Pai's strong criticism of what he and others saw as the Obama White House's pressure on the agency during the net neutrality debate, Pai should run an independent ship. Nonetheless, he's likely to steer it toward the pro-marketplace, pro-business agenda Γrump has been touting as the route to America's "return" to greatness.

In his inaugural address to FCC staffers — a tradition for a new chairman — Pai

emphasized closing the digital divide, though emphasizing the role of the private sector in that effort. Still, that had the lawyer who successfully argued for the FCC's Title 11-based Open Internet rules in court hoping that, rather than reversing those rules, as Pai has pledged, would occupy the chair-

"The new chairman's first message to the FCC struck the perfect tone of inclusiveness and articulated a substantive goal that everyone could and should rally around - closing the digital divide," Pantelis Michalopoulos, a partner in Steptoe & Johnson, told Multichannel News. "On more divisive issues, such as the Open Internet, there is every reason to be optimistic that the chairman will be led by the facts, wherever they lead, and by his formidable intellect, rather than by dogma."

Perhaps, but Pai has shown no signs of backing off his. strong criticisms of classifying broadband as a common-carrier service under Title II of the Communications Act.

Certainly advocacy group Demand Progress, which fought for reclassification, was not looking for any kumbaya moment from Pai on net neutrality.

"Pai is a guy who said after Trump was elected that neutrality's 'days are numbered' and that he would 'fire up the weed

whacker' to gut protections like the Open Internet rule," the group said in an email to supporters last week, even using the threat to try to raise money to renew the Open Internet fight, adding: "Will you chip in \$5 to help us fight back against Trump's antinet neutrality FCC chairman?"

But it will take some time for the new chairman to come up with the legal argument for unclassifying ISPs as common carriers given that the court upheld the reclassification under Democratic chairman Tom Wheeler.

But it may be up to the FCC given that Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.), chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, last week said he is "not there yet" on a bipartisan net neutrality bill. In the short term, Pai can take various steps to blunt the Title II instrument, includ-

ing not aggressively enforcing a general conduct standard he has criticized, and perhaps issuing new guidance on zero rating plans. He was highly critical of the 11th- hour signal to AT&T that its DirecTV Now over-the-top service appeared to be an anticompetitive violation of the Open Internet order under the general conduct standard.

Pai was also critical of the FCC's broadband privacy framework, but that would be mooted if he can reverse Title II reclassification, since that was what deeded the FCC authority over broadband privacy.

The new chairman has already signaled some shortterm goals, which likely include extending the small business exemption from the FCC's enhanced Open Internet reporting requirements to cable operators and telecoms of 250,000 subscribers or fewer, rather than the current 100,000 cut-off. That is, unless Congress beats him to it. A bill that would do essentially that has been reintroduced.

Pai has also been asked by top House Republicans to officially close the set-top box docket - he strongly opposed Wheeler's "unlock the box" effort, and was said to be considering the request at press time. O

Name Game Plays Out at Portals

 $WASHINGTON-With \, a \, \hbox{2--} I \, Republican \, majority \, on \, the \,$ Federal Communications Commission, the Trump administration is unlikely to be rushing to fill its two open seats, one for a Republican and one for a Democrat.

But the name game has already begun inside the Beltway, driven by various scenarios.

If Mignon Clyburn, currently the only FCC Democrat, were to decide to leave, that would leave the commission without a quorum and unable to vote on items.

Under that scenario, Jessica Rosenworcel, the Democrat forced off the commission in December over a partisan fight between the Senate majority and minority leaders, could be reinstated — as some have pushed for — paired with the renomination of new chairman Ajit Pai, whose term expired last June.

He can serve through the end of December in any event, but since Congress likes to pair nominees, one from each party, the need for a third, Dem, for a quorum and to renominate Pai could produce that scenario. Roseworcel is still popular on both sides of the aisle, including with new Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.), who would traditionally get the pick, but President Trump is anything but traditional.

But there will be two more seats to fill in any event. Among the names that have surfaced for the Republican seat are Brandt Hershman, the Indiana legislator said to be a friend of Vice President Mike Pence, whose name surfaced as possible chairman; Viacom lobbyist Keith Murphy; Monica Desai, a former bureau chief under Republican chairman Kevin Martin and now with Facebook; and Chip Pickering, a former GOP House member from Mississippi now heading INCOMPAS.

On the Democratic side, John Branscome, who succeeded Rosenworcel as senior communications counsel when she joined the FCC, has been mentioned.

How Comcast Reversed Course — and Grew Subs

While the rest of the telecom world was focusing on the potential of a Verizon-Charter merger (see story above), Comcast reported its quietly made the case for the cable business, reporting fourth-quarter results that were, by subscriber metrics, its best view best seen metrics, its best view by subscriber metrics.

Comcast ended the year with 161,000 more video subscribers than it started with, the first time the MSO has shown year over-year basic-video customer growth

since 2006. At the same time, the cable unit grew revenue by 6.6% for the year (7.1% for the quarter), while cash flow was up 5.6% annually and 6.4% for the three-month

Analysts had been expecting Comcast to deliver strong results, and the operator delivered. Quarterly video customers grew by 80,000 (beating analysts' consensus estimates of 75,000 additions), while broadband growth continued with the addition of 385,000 subscribers, about even with consensus.

ln a research note, Morgan Stanley media

analyst Ben Swinburne wrote that with the continued strength of its XI platform, he expects the subscriber growth to continue. Comcast finished the year with XI penetration of about 50%, which should grow to more than 60% by the end of 2017.

Comcast chairman and CEO Brian Roberts also revealed on a conference call discussing results that the MSO plans to offer a much anticipated wireless product in mid-2017 as part of a larger bundle.

Roberts didn't offer a lot of color on the product rollout, which comes as part of Comcast's Mobile Virtual Network Operator (MVNO) agreement with Verizon. The MVNO deal was part of the Spectrum Co cable consortium's sale of its wireless licenses to Verizon in 2011 (Comcast was a member).

Some analysts have speculated the wireless product could use Comcast's own WiFi network and rely on Verizon's for "roaming," or when users travel outside Comcast territory.



Comcast Allays Cord-Cutting Fears With Surge in Subscribers

Comcast Corp. is living in a golden age of TV -- cable TV.

The largest U.S. cable operator gained TV customers in four of the past five quarters and added to its subscriber rolls for the first time in almost a decade, countering a trend of precipitous decline in traditional pay-TV and reclaiming market share from some telecom carriers and satellite-TV providers.

The turnaround in the cable business helped Comcast beat profit estimates for the fourth quarter. Executives attribute the momentum in their cable-TV business largely to their new video platform, called X1, which makes it easier to search for shows and movies on TV and on Netflix from their cable set-top box.

Meanwhile, Comcast is still growing by selling high-speed internet. The company signed up 385,000 new broadband customers in the quarter, topping the average prediction of about 380,000 from three analysts. It signed up 460,000 broadband subscribers in the same quarter a year ago.

Comcast is also pushing into the wireless business. By the middle of this year, the cable provider plans to offer a mobile phone service that lets subscribers make calls and surf the web using Verizon's wireless network and Comcast's millions of Wi-Fi hotspots.

Total revenue rose 9.2% to \$21 billion in the quarter, topping analysts' estimates of \$20.7 billion. Comcast signed up 80,000 new cable-TV customers in the period, topping the 77,929 average of analysts' estimates. Net income for the quarter was \$2.3 billion, up 17% from a year earlier. The average monthly customer bill climbed 3.8% to \$150.58.

Comcast's Universal film unit, which acquired DreamWorks Animation last year, generated \$1.83 billion in sales during the period, up 13% from a year earlier, driven by the box-office success of the animated feature "Sing." Sales in the business services division, which sells phone, web and video services to companies, rose 15% to \$1.44 billion.

Revenue at the NBC Universal group, which includes the NBC broadcast network, cable channels such as USA and MSNBC , the Universal film studio and theme parks, grew 13% to \$8.45 billion. The results were helped partly by the NFL expanding some of its Thursday Night Football broadcasts to include NBC. Cable network sales gained 4% to \$2.5 billion.

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The Beginning of the End for HFC?

We've spent the last few years watching the slow death of telephone copper networks. Rural telcos all over the country are rapidly replacing their copper with fiber. AT&T has made it clear that they would like to get out of the copper business and tear down their old copper networks. Verizon has expressed the same but decided to sell a lot of their copper networks rather than be the ones to tear them down. And CenturyLink has started the long process of replacing copper with fiber and passed a million homes with fiber in urban areas in 2016.

Very oddly, the dying copper technology got a boost when the FCC decided to award money to the big rural copper owners like Frontier, CenturyLink and Windstream. These companies are now using CAF II money to try to squeeze one more generation of life out of clearly old and obsolete copper. Without that CAF II money we'd be seeing a lot more copper replacement.

I've been in the telco industry long enough to remember significant new telco copper construction. While a lot of the copper network is old and dates back to the 50s and 60s, there was still some new copper construction as recently as a decade ago, with major new construction before that. But nobody is building new telco copper networks these days, which is probably the best way to define that the technology is dead – although it's going to take decades for the copper on poles to die.

This set me to thinking about the hybrid coaxial networks (HFC) operated by the cable companies. Most of these networks were built in the 60s and 70s when cable companies sprang up in urban areas across the country. There are rural HFC networks stretching back into the 50s. It struck me that nobody I know of is building new HFC networks. Sure, some cable companies are still using HFC technology to reach a new subdivision, but nobody would invest in HFC for a major new build. All of the big cable companies have quietly switched to fiber technology when they build any sizable new subdivision.

If telco copper networks started their decline when companies stopped building new copper networks, then we have probably now reached that same turning point with HFC. Nobody is building new HFC networks. What's hanging on poles today is going to last for a while, but HFC networks will eventually take the same path into decline as copper networks.

There will be a lot of work and money poured into keeping HFC networks alive. Cable companies everywhere are looking at upgrades to DOCSIS 3.1 as a way to get more speeds out of the technology – much in the same way that DSL prolonged copper networks. The big cable companies, in particular, don't want to spend the capital dollars needed to replace HFC with fiber – Wall Street will punish any cable company that tries to do so.

Cable networks have a few characteristics that give them a better life than telephone copper. Having the one giant wire in an HFC network is superior to having large numbers of tiny wires in a copper network which go bad one-by-one over time.

But cable networks also have one big downside compared to copper networks – they leak interference into the world and are harder to maintain. The HFC technology uses radio waves inside the coaxial cable as the method to transmit signal. Unfortunately, these radio waves can leak out into the outside world at any place where there is a break in the cable. And there are huge numbers of breaks in an HFC network – one at every place where a tap is placed to bring a drop to a customer. Each of the taps and other splices in a cable network are sources of potential frequency leakage. Cable companies spend a lot every year cleaning up the most egregious leaks – and as networks get older they leak more.

Certainly HFC networks are going to be around for a long time to come. But we will slowly start seeing them replaced with fiber. Altice is the first cable company to say they will be replacing their HFC network with fiber over the next few years. I really don't expect the larger cable companies to follow suit and in future years we will be deriding the networks used by Comcast and Charter in the same way we do old copper networks today. But I think that somewhere in the last year or two we saw the peak of HFC, and from that point forward the technology is beginning the slow slide into obsolescence.
